Treasurer's Report – Fiscal Year 2023-24

With this special edition of our newsletter, I would like to let you know that DCWC has been able to continue to be generous to our community because of our most generous members, YOU!!! For some of you who are new and those who remember, we used to have a Spring Luncheon in May, which we haven't had the past 2 or 3 years. At this event, we would recognize all the scholarship and grant recipients as well as publish in the

program, new officers (every other year). So, in this special edition of our newsletter, we thought we would have the scholarship and grant recipients and I thought I would give you some financial tid-bits you may not know. So, here it is:

We have our assets in 3 places:

- 22% is in Chase Bank we use this to run our annual income and expenses.
- 44% is in the Dayton Foundation General Fund This was started 25 years ago to secure funds and use for extra community needs.
- 34% is in the Dayton Foundation Scholarship Fund This was started about 12 years ago when we received a generous donation to be used specifically for education.

Each year our financial distribution averages about:

- 35% Religious Collaborations
- 30% Educational Projects
- 20% Charitable Organizations
- 15% Social Needs & Events

All of our income comes from dues, profits made from events, and from generous donors, such as yourself, who help support the great work that we do. I hope that all of you enjoy reading this special edition of our newsletter with all the details about the scholarship and grant recipients as well as this short breakdown of finance information. More detailed reports will be published in our next membership directory with 2-years of annual reports. DCWC Archives-New Home for History and Memories by Pat Rau

As our organization moves forward, the Board wanted a plan to save the historical items of DCWC. Soon after the Jubilee celebration, Sister Thelma Wurzelbacher, C.PP.S., our Spiritual Advisor, began researching options for a place to permanently store our materials. For most of the years of its history, the stacks of papers, notebooks and pictures were stored in bins in the basement of Emmanuel Church. Of course, DCWC is thankful for the kindness of the parish for doing this for us.

A permanent home for DCWC's history will keep the records safe and make them easier to access. We contacted a certified archivist employed by the Sisters of the Precious Blood for advice and then sent a letter of inquiry to the University of Dayton Library. A beautiful response came quickly and with a silver lining! The U.S. Catholic Special Collection of the University of Dayton Libraries wanted our donation.

So, with samples of DCWC newsletters, minutes, scrapbooks and financial reports in hand, Sr. Thelma and Pat Rau, historian, met with Stephanie Shreffler, Associate Professor and certified Archivist. Professor Shreffler will manage our collection and Sr. Thelma will continue as contact.

We must remember our contribution of 100 years of records is not replaceable, is unique, is a primary means for scholarly research and study about religious organizations, women's groups, and Catholic church communities within the Archdiocese. Since DCWC's patron is Our Lady of Good Counsel, it is a wonderful fit in the Marianist environment of UD.

DCWC's historical records enrich the collective memory, past and present, have enduring historical value, and document spiritual trends in the life of the Church. Sharing it takes it beyond DCWC. In fact, the Dayton Knights of Columbus, Council 500, is already archived there, including correspondences, membership records, financial reports, newsletters, publications, organization information and more. Their materials can be accessed with an online guide. In time, our materials will offer balance as a parallel gift with a Catholic women's perspective.

Some typical ways that archival collections are used at UD are for individual scholarly research, research by students in religion, history, sociology classes, display in exhibits, and more.

The U.S. Catholic Special Collection is also accessible to the public, near and far. The archive's environment is specially controlled, storage boxes and folders are unique in construction, and original photos are formatted for online access and printing. The library is licensed to share copyrighted items and sources are documented. Accruals can be made after the online guide is completed with existing materials. The Deed of Gift form was signed by DCWC board members. The official transfer occurred in March 2024.

Ways to Say Your Spring Prayers

Spring can be a great time for spring cleaning, starting new projects, or even refreshing your prayer life. Try these new ways to pray during the spring season.

1. Pray in a Garden

Saying your prayers in a new location can be a great way to revitalize your practice and get a new perspective on life. This spring, make a habit of praying amongst the flowers. Go into your own garden, a public park, or a local community garden and find a spot to connect with God. Pick a spot that is comfortable where you can have a little quiet. As you pray, slowly breathe in and out. Savor the scent of life around you—from the nourishing soil to the fragrance of the flowers. Remember that everything around you was made by God, just like you.

2. Pray by the Window

If you can't make it out to the garden or park, you can still focus on your prayer time by making a comfortable and inspiring prayer spot in your home. Consider making yours next to a window so you can look out over God's creation—like the budding flowers, the new green of the trees, and the returning birds. Make the space comfortable with a good chair and pillows. Bring your Bible or devotional to help you pray. Maybe even add a vase of flowers or houseplants to lighten up the space and truly bring you into the spring mindset.

3. Pray While You Walk

With warmer weather finally here, spring is the perfect time to begin or restart your daily walks. Whether you walk in the morning or after a busy day at work, dedicate this time to prayer. As you focus on your steps and breathing, you'll be surprised how naturally a talk with God will come to fruition. Let the world around you guide your prayers. If you see the tree on your block beginning to finally grow green, thank God for the nature around us that brings us joy and keeps us alive. If you pass by your neighbors, wave hello and say a prayer for them and their family.

4. Pray with a Candle

The spring season can be a hectic time. Between schedules, spring cleaning, and outdoor activities starting up again, it can be difficult to find time to sit down and focus on your prayers. Even if you find the time, your thoughts might drift to busy schedules and errands while you pray. Try using a candle while you pray to keep your attention on your time with God. Here is how to pray with a candle: Find a quiet spot in your home where you can be alone, even for a few minutes. Let your mind slow as you light the candle. As you pray, focus on the flame of the candle and its movements. If you feel your thoughts going astray, simply bring your attention back to the flame and pick up your prayers where you left off.

5. Pray When It Rains

"April showers bring May flowers," goes the saying. You can use the rainy spring season to commit to praying more often. Make a prayer habit of praying every time it rains. Every time you hear those raindrops hit the window, step away from your work or chores to say a spring prayer. Even just taking a few minutes to check in with God can make a world of difference. Soon you'll find yourself getting excited when the forecast calls for yet another day of rain.
