For this newsletter I would like to focus on our devotion to Mary, our intercessor. October 7th was The Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. Mary, not fully understanding the circumstances of her being the mother of Jesus, fully trusted God. She also believed that the Child she was to have would result in great good. Praying the Rosary can help us focus on the Life of Christ and His sacrifice for us. Mary spent her life saying yes to God. Following and trusting in His plan for her son. The Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious and Luminous mysteries take us through the Life of Christ and God's plan for our Salvation. DCWC October was also our Day of Recollection. Jeanne Hunt, our guest speaker, spoke about the Miraculous Medal. Like the Rosary, it is a sacramental. The Miraculous Medal is a Catholic symbol that represents Mary's love and desire to help people and is meant to be worn with trust and love. The Medal is a visual reminder of our salvation through Jesus Christ. The medal's many symbols have specific meanings. On the front side, Mary stands on a globe, crushing a serpent under her feet, and rays of light come from her hands. This symbolizes Mary's role as Queen of Heaven and Earth, and the graces she gives to those who ask. The year 1830 commemorates the year Mary appeared to St. Catherine Labouré. On the back side, a cross and the letter "M" are featured on the back of the medal. The cross represents Christ's sacrifice, and the "M" stands for Mary. The two hearts represent the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Sorrowful Heart of Mary. The medal is also surrounded by twelve stars, which can represent the twelve Apostles. I would like to reflect on Mary as we pray, "Oh Mary conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee." I left with the wonderful knowledge that Mary teaches us to come to her, she listens and wants a relationship with us. Stay close to Mary. Have a personal relationship with her, the signs are there! Learn from her the value of every human life, working to know God's Love, and to pray for all those in any kind of need.

Have a wonderful Thanksgiving and I look forward to seeing you at the Christmas Boutique. Bring a friend, bring lots of friends! It will spark that Christmas Spirit!

Message of Inspiration – Message Two National Eucharistic Congress – Indianapolis, IN

My Sisters in Christ

As I wrote in the previous newsletter, I had the privilege to attend this wonderful National Eucharistic Congress, which was held in Indianapolis this summer with approximately 25 others from my parish. It was an opportunity I'll never forget and felt called to share with you what we took away from our experiences.

The precipice for this event stemmed from a 2019 PEW poll that found a majority of Catholics doubted that the true Body and Blood of Christ Jesus is present in the Eucharist. As this is the core tenet as well as the Source and Summit of our faith, the council of Bishops formulated a 3-year plan for a Eucharistic Revival. The first year was a Diocesan focus on leaders who held firm to this tenet and could help bring it into the parishes at a deeper level. Year two was the Parish focus with the Eucharistic Congress being that moment and momentum to carry into Year three which focuses on Mission to the entire church as well as the world. The Eucharistic Congress is not a new idea. It originated in the 1800s and the US has hosted two international Congresses. The first was in Chicago in 1926 with almost a million people attending the closing mass and the second in Philadelphia in 1976 where hundreds of thousands of people attended.

In 1930, a National Congress was held in Omaha in which lay people, like ourselves, were invited to attend and approximately 60,000 did. A second national congress in Cleveland in 1935 had 60-80 thousand attend and this summer, another 60,000 came to gather in Indianapolis.

One of our attendees commented on what an interesting experience it was being around so many who believe in Christ. He said, "Thousands of people were everywhere, yet everyone was kind and patient. We always felt safe, people smiled and were generally happy even after the two plus hours in the check-in line. Wouldn't it be great if the world was like this all of the time?" Another attendee commented on the joy of those around us....strangers greeting each other with a smile and hello, clergy stopping to pray with or for someone who may have approached them; "gaggles" of Nuns we called them who were laughing and singing while they walked. It was truly inspiring.

This year, we were there to pray, go to Mass, and listen to the Lord through music. Then each of us had our own breakout sessions, in which we heard speakers giving us the message that we were meant to hear in our own way. Then we all came together again at the end of the day to spend more time with our Lord in Adoration. In the last message I asked you to ask yourself honestly...Do I truly believe that Jesus is present, body, blood, soul and divinity in the Eucharist? No

matter how you answer this, we are encouraged to think of the Eucharist with more reverence and adoration, by attending adoration at your local church as the Lord is always waiting for you to come and visit with Him. It is his way to share his Love to you.

God said, "Let there be light and there was light (Genesis 1:3). In Isaiah 55:11, He says "As My word comes forth from me, it does not return without accomplishing its purpose". Through God the Father, Jesus spoke and revoked demons, healed ailments and raised the dead. While at the last supper with his apostles, He spoke again...This is my Body....This is the chalice of my Blood. How powerful to know that what God says, IS.

Again, thank you for letting me share more of my story and know that I continue to pray that even though you didn't have the personal experience of attending, you may gain some knowledge and grace from these messages.
